Character Analysis

This analysis will help you develop a character profile by identifying your aptitudes (or spiritual gifts), tendencies and interests. You may use this as a stand-alone assessment or as supplementary worksheets for the book, *Making the Transition*.

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Aptitude Analysis

To the left of each statement below, enter a number that shows how accurately it describes you. For example, if you almost always are "very organized and enjoy organizing others," then enter a 4 beside the statement. After completing the entire analysis, add the numbers for each group of statements and record the amount in the "Total" space after each group. The totals should range from 0 to 12.

### **Aptitudes**

The Aptitude Analysis section examined 29 aptitudes (A1 to A29). You should have a number in each box labeled A1 through A29; each number is the total for an aptitude and should range from 0 to 12. Transfer those numbers to the corresponding spaces below.

Your highest scores should identify your strongest aptitudes. For example, if A24 has one of your highest scores, then Serving is probably one of your strongest aptitudes. Having several strong aptitudes is normal, so identify your top three and mark them with stars. Your absolute scores are not as important as the relative differences.

These results are tentative and you should consider them as possibilities for several reasons. For one, the questionnaire is simple and rather short, so it has a larger margin of error than a much larger analysis would have.

Unfortunately, we are unable or unwilling to see ourselves as we really are. We may try to emulate someone we admire or put on a mask that represents who we think we should be. You probably even answered some of the questions the way you think a Christian *should*.

Another factor is that we don't really know who we are, so God has to show us through revelation, teaching and life experiences. He peels off our facades layer by layer, gradually revealing our true qualities and the sins for which we must repent.

So be alert to self-deception. Realize you don't see yourself as you really are, which even affects the way you completed the analysis. Your results may be accurate or they may just be a starting point, so consider them possibilities.

When you complete the Personal Profile in Part 5, you will have opportunity to adjust your results as needed.

You may have scored high on an aptitude you do not think you have. If you really do not have that aptitude, the wording of the analysis statements may have caused you to respond incorrectly, giving you a false score. It is also possible you do have the aptitude and have not yet discovered it. The high scores merely suggest your strongest aptitudes and give you something to consider.

Your lowest scores identify what you are not. Knowing which aptitudes you do not have is as important as knowing which ones you do. This might show why you have trouble doing what others can do so easily.

Read the chapters in Part 3 of this workbook that describe your strongest aptitudes. Prayerfully consider the sections describing the perversion and redemption of your aptitudes, because these probably reveal the present state of your character and what God intends for it to become.

#### **Tendencies**

The Tendency Analysis section examined five basic tendencies (T1 to T5, each having two or more possibilities: a, b, and so on). You should have a number in each box labeled T1a through T5b; each number is the total for a tendency and should range from 0 to 12. Transfer those numbers to the corresponding spaces below.

Consider each tendency separately. For example, General Orientation has two options: extrovert and introvert. The absolute scores are not as important as the relative differences. If one score is much higher than the other, then you have a strong orientation; you may be a strong extrovert, for example. On the other hand, if the results for T1a and T1b are about the same, you have some of both orientations.

As with the aptitude analysis, consider these results as possibilities or merely starting points. After you read the tendency descriptions, you will have opportunity to adjust your results when you complete the Personal Profile in Part 5.

Read the chapters in Part 4 of this workbook that describe your tendencies. Prayerfully consider the sections describing the perversion and redemption of your tendencies.

#### **Interests**

Your compelling interests motivate you to do something and they help define the environment in which you enjoy using your abilities. Using the results of your "Interest Analysis," try to identify your compelling interests and record them in the space below.

Many experiences in life influence or even determine your interests. Not all of those experiences are from God, however, and not all of your reasons for being interested are godly. Therefore, examining your interests to see whether they are from God -- or what aspect may be from Him -- is important. If one of your interests seems ungodly, consider whether it is a sinful perversion of a Godgiven interest. God gave you interests compatible with His plan for your life so you'll be motivated to do His will. Sin has obscured or perverted those interests, as it has your character, but with God's help, you can identify the interests He gave you and discover they clarify your life purpose.

This may be more difficult than identifying your aptitudes and tendencies, but the results can be very worthwhile. Try not to prejudge your interests, thinking they are unreasonable or impossible to fulfill. The purpose is to identify what really interests you, what makes you come alive.

Don't be concerned at this stage about accurately identifying your compelling interests. When you read the descriptions of your aptitudes and tendencies, you will see how sin perverts every good thing God gave you, including your interests, and how He redeems them. That will help you see past their sinful expressions to identify your God-given compelling interests.
